Instructions

- 1) The Scout is to review the merit badge book <u>before</u> the first week of PowWow.
- 2) Bring this work sheet, paper, and pencil or pen each week.

Requirement Instructions*

- 1) Requirement 1 should be completed **prior to the first session of PowWow.**
- 2) Requirements 2a, 2b, and 3 should be passed off during the first session of PowWow.
- 3) Requirements 2c, 6, 7, 8, and 9 should be completed as **homework** between the sessions of PowWow.
- 4) Requirements 4 and 5 should be passed off during the second session of PowWow.

*Due to possible time constraints at the PowWow, certain requirements that were originally planned to be completed in class may need to be completed as homework. Please LISTEN to ALL INSTRUCTIONS in class to be aware of any changes.

Requirement 1 Earn the First Aid Merit Badge.

Do the following:

- 1. Discuss with your counselor the aspects of emergency preparedness:
 - A. **Prepare** for emergency situations
 - B. **Respond** to emergency situations
 - C. **Recover** from emergency situations
 - D. Mitigate and prevent emergency situations

Include in your discussion the kinds of questions that are important to ask yourself as you consider each of these.

B. Make a chart that demonstrates your understanding of each of the three aspects of emergency preparedness in requirement 2a (prepare, respond, recover, mitigate) with regard to 10 of the situations listed below. You must use situations 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 below in boldface but you may choose any other five listed here for a total of 10 situations. Discuss this chart with your counselor.

C. Meet with and teach your family how to get or build a kit, make a plan, and be informed for the situations on the chart you created for requirement 2b. Complete a family plan. Then meet with your counselor and report on your family meeting, discuss their responses, and share your family plan.

Requirement 3 Show how you could safely save a person from the following: A. Touching a live household electric wire.

- B. A room filled with carbon monoxide.
- C. Clothes on fire.
- D. Drowning using non-swimming rescues (including accidents on ice)

Requirement 4

Show three ways of attracting and communicating with rescue planes/aircraft.

Requirement 5

With another person, *show* a good way to transport an injured person out of a remote and/or rugged area, conserving the energy of rescuers while ensuring the well-being and protection of the injured person.

Requirement 6

Do the following:

- **A.** Tell the things a group of Scouts should be prepared to do, the training they need, and the safety precautions they should take for the following emergency services:
 - **a.** Crowd and traffic control.
 - **b.** Messenger service and communication.
 - c. Collection and distribution services.
 - **d.** Group feeding, shelter, and sanitation.
- **B.** Identify the government or community agencies that normally handle and prepare for the emergency services listed under 6a, and explain to your counselor how a group of Scouts could volunteer to help in the event of these types of emergencies.
- **C.** Find out who is your community's emergency management director and learn what this person does to **prepare**, **respond to, recover from,** and **mitigate and prevent** emergency situations in your community. Discuss this information with your counselor and apply what you discover to the chart you created for requirement 2b.

Merit badge work sheets will not be accepted at the Council Office in place of the official Merit Badge Application Card. Those who do not complete all the requirements should take their partially completed merit badge work sheet and their official application card to their local merit badge counselors for completion.

Requirement 8

Do the following:

a. Prepare a written plan for mobilizing your troop when needed to do emergency service. If there is already a plan, explain it. Tell your part in making it work.

b. Take part in at least one troop mobilization. Before the exercise, describe your part to your counselor. Afterward, conduct an "after-action" lesson, discussing what you learned during the exercise that required changes or adjustments to the plan.

Prepare a personal emergency service pack for a mobilization call. Prepare a family kit (suitcase or waterproof c. box) for use by your family in case an emergency evacuation is needed. Explain the needs and uses of the contents.

Requirement 9

Do ONE of the following:

- Using a safety checklist approved by your counselor, inspect your home for potential hazards. Explain the a. hazards you find and how they can be corrected. Attach the sheet to this worksheet to show your counselor.
- b. Review or develop a plan of escape for your family in case of fire in your home.
- c. Develop an accident prevention program for five family activities outside the home (such as taking a picnic or seeing a movie) that includes an analysis of possible hazards, a proposed plan to correct those hazards, and the reasons for the corrections you propose.

Requirement 7 Take part in an emergency service project, either a real one or a practice drill, with a Scouting unit or a community agency.

Sample Home Safety Checklist

Sample Checklist for Requirement 9 a. Check safety steps that being taking in your home. Write N/A if the item is not applicable. Items left blank may present a safety hazard. This list provides some sample safety steps you might take. See your Safety Merit Badge pamphlet and counselor for more information. Ask your parent or guardian before making any changes.

Stairways, Halls, and Outdoor Steps

____ Stairways with three or more steps have a strong handrail.

____ Stairs/halls are kept free from boxes, toys, brooms, tools, etc.

____ Gates at top and bottom of stairs prevent children from falling.

____ The head and foot of stairs have no small or loose rugs.

____ Stair carpeting or covering is fastened securely.

____ Stairways & halls have good lighting, controllable at each end.

Kitchen

____ Matches are kept where children cannot get them.

____ Knives & sharp instruments are kept in knife drawers or holder.

_ Can openers don't leave sharp edges on cans.

____ Disinfectants & cleaning products are out of reach of children.

___ Pan handles are turned away from stove edges.

____ Spilled grease, water, or bits of food are wiped up immediately.

____ Pot holders are within easy reach.

____ A fire extinguisher is mounted near the stove.

Bathroom

____ Tub and shower are equipped with strong handholds. ____ Tub floor has non-slip surface.

____ Poisons are marked, sealed shut, and out of reach of children.

____ Medicines are out of reach of children in childproof containers.

____ No one takes medicine in the dark.

Attic and Basement

____ Ladder is strong, solid, and sturdily constructed.

____ Stairway is sturdy and well lighted.

____ Children keep skates and play gear in a specific place.

. ____ Walls and beams are free from protruding nails.

Fuses or circuit breakers are the proper size.

____ Rubbish & flammable materials are in covered metal cans.

____ Wastepaper is kept away from furnace and stairs.

Living Room and Dining Room

____ Furniture is placed to allow easy passage in an emergency.

_____ Before bedtime, furniture placement is checked for orderliness.

____ Furniture and woodwork solid, in good repair, and free from.

____ Fireplace screen fits snugly.

____ Rugs are fastened or laid on non-slip pads.

____ Rugs are kept from curling at their edges.

____ Wax on floors is thoroughly buffed.

____ Fire in fireplace is extinguished at bedtime.

____ Candles are in stable holders and fully extinguished after use.

Bedroom

____ Smoke alarm has fresh battery or electrical connection & is tested regularly.

____ Carbon monoxide detector has fresh battery or electrical connection and is tested regularly.

____ Furniture placement for clear passage between bed and door.

____ Light switch or lamp is within easy reach from bed.

____ A night-light illuminates bedroom or hall.

____ Bureau and dresser drawers are closed when not in use.

Bar across bunk beds helps prevent falls.

____ Children are taught not to lean against windows or screens.

____ Sturdily screen low windows to prevent children from falling.

Smoking in bed is prohibited.

____ Gas and electric heating devices are turned off at bedtime.

Nursery

____ Bars on cribs are closely spaced.

Crib is approved by Consumer Products or similar.

____ Crib is free from sharp edges or corners.

____ Sleeping garments and covers keep baby warm without

danger of smothering.

Pillows are kept out of bassinet or crib.

____ No thin, plastic material is in or near the crib.

____ Children are taught not to give marbles, etc. to younger

children.

____ Toys are sturdy & have no sharp edges.

____ Nontoxic paint is used on baby furniture and toys.

____ All houseplants are nonpoisonous.

Stoves, Furnaces, and Heaters

___ Stoves are away from curtains.

____ Stoves & furnaces are inspected & cleaned annually.

____ Gas burners are properly adjusted and free from leaks.

____ Gas water and space heaters are equipped with vents or flues.

____ Water heater or boiler has a safety valve & is checked yearly.

Flames of gas burners are protected from drafts.

____ Insulating shield protects woodwork within 18" of furnace, etc.

____ Keep flammable materials away from stoves, furnaces, etc.

____ A wrench is stored near the shut-off valve of outside gas line.

Porch, Yard, and Garage

____ Railings and banisters are sound and inspected periodically.

_ Steps and walks are kept free from ice and snow.

____ Yard/play space are free from holes, stones, glass, etc.

_____ Tools and dangerous articles are out of reach of children.

____ Dangerous products & chemicals are kept in original containers

in locked storage areas.

____ Wires and low fences are brightly painted or clearly marked.

____ Wells, cisterns, and pits are kept securely covered. ____ Disposable materials are not burned outside.

An area is marked off in the garage for bicycles, wagons, etc.

Lawn mower is equipped with proper safeguards.

Workshop

_ Good ventilation exists, especially when sanding.

____ Safety goggles and/or face mask are available, with eyewash.

Baking soda is kept handy to neutralize acid burns.

____ All electrical tools are either three-wire or doubleinsulated.

____ Work area is well lit & free of clutter, scraps, rags.

____ All tools have a place & are in their place.

____ Guards are in place on all power tools.

____ A push stick is available for use with power saws.

Electrical Devices and Fixtures

Electrical fixtures and appliances are located & used beyond arm's length of the sink, stove, tub, shower, or other grounded metal unless outlet is protected by a ground-fault interrupter.

Do not touch electrical fixtures or appliances with wet hands.

____ Disconnect seldom-used appliances when not in use.

____ All pull-type sockets have an insulating link.

Household appliances are disconnected before repairs.

____ Unused, open, screw-type sockets are plugged closed.

Frayed or worn electric cords are promptly replaced.
Long trailing cords are not in evidence.

____ Cords are kept out from under rugs, doors, and furniture.

____ UA-approved extension cords are the proper size.

____ Children are taught never to touch electric sockets or fixtures.

____ Fuses are adequate for the load and are not bypassed.

Circuit breakers are not overloaded.

General

____ At least one smoke detector in each bedroom & garage.

Everything has a place and is in its place.

____ Stepladders are in good repair and stored out of the way.

____ Window screens and storm windows are securely fastened.

____ Guns are stored unloaded and in locked cases.

- ____ Guns and ammunition are stored separately.
- Children are permitted to use only blunt-end scissors.

____ Housework clothing has no drooping sleeves, sashes, or frills.

____ Shoes worn for housework have low heels.

___ All shoes are in good repair.

_____ Kerosene, gasoline, paint thinners, and other volatile materials are stored outside in special, clearly marked metal containers.

____ Oil mops, dust rags, painting equipment, and other oily materials are stored outside in open metal containers.

____ Everyone turns on a light before entering a dark room.

____ Matches are extinguished before they're thrown away.

____ Children are never permitted to play with matches.

____ Fire extinguishers are readily available.

For Emergency

____ Know how to get emergency help (911, poison control, etc.).

____ Be able to find water, gas, & electric shutoffs. Check annually.

____ First aid kit approved by your doctor/American Red Cross.

____ Know basic first aid procedures.

- ____ Have a fire escape plan from your home.
- ____ Emergency water supply.
- ____ Handheld flashlights readily available.

____ In earthquake-prone areas, make sure that the
